
### School Symbol





# The Basic Guidelines for Curriculum Organization

# General Framework of Seoul Global High School Curriculum

- 1) Aim of the 2022 Curriculum
- · Implementing of the Seoul Innovative Future Curriculum that aims to foster well-rounded, democratic intellectuals with a sound mind and body
- · Organizing a school curriculum that systematically links the curriculum, instruction and assessment
- · Offering a student-customized elective curriculum in accordance with the students' aptitude and career path
- · Organizing and implementing a curriculum according to the school foundation principles and purpose
- 2) Guidelines for curriculum organization and implementation
- The curriculum must include a total of 204 units which includes 180 units from subject areas and 24 units (408 hours) from creative experiential activities.
- · All students must complete the common core subjects before taking the advanced subjects.
- · The number of subjects for each semester must be organized considering the students' academic workload and to make the learning experience more meaningful.
- The curriculum must include a minimum of 6 units of Korean History for 2 semesters and a minimum of 10 units of Physical Education every semester for 3 years
- The curriculum must be organized according to the hierarchy of subjects when arranging the electives.
- The students must complete a minimum of 72 units of international track courses from the specialized subjects I which must account for 50% and up and foreign language courses.

# Various curriculum organization and implementation according to the school foundation principles

- 1) Developing research competency
  - · Organize Subject Research in creative experiential activity to satisfy the students' desire to learn
- 2) Establish and implement courses that are internationally accredited and that meet the standards of the school's educational purpose









- · Organize courses that were granted the AP(Advanced Placement) level
  - AP Calculus, AP Micro-Economics, AP Macro-Economics, AP Human Geography, AP Modern World History
- · Open courses that meet the standards of the school's educational purpose
  - Korean Language in Global Era, Public Speaking and Presentation Skills, English Critical Reading and Writing, Mathematical Thinking and Statistics, Statistics for Social Science, Modern Society & Philosophy, Traditional Arts and Philosophy, Local Studies for Understanding the World, Comparative Culture, World Issues & Future Society, etc.
- 3) Organize liberal arts courses that develop the student's thinking and language skills
  - · Organize unique liberal arts courses that satisfy students' various learning desires such as Essay Writing (12th), Philosophy (11th), Second Language (Spanish, Chinese, French Language), etc.
- 4) Organize unique creative experiential activities that meet the students' demands and the school's educational standards and Schoolwide Learner Outcome (SLO).
  - · Activities aimed to support school life: Organizing unique creative experiential activities that lets students think globally and satisfies students' desire to learn such as Developing English Communicative Skills (10th), 1-Student-1-Talent Program (10th), Subject Research (11th), Career Guidance (11th & 12th), Health (12th) etc.





#### **Grading System**

#### Policies

- 1) To enhance the responsibility of teachers and school in the course of evaluation and grading procedures
- 2) To make sure that all forms of academic assessments (regular examinations and performance tests) take place as a form of helping students achieve academic goals and are done based on each student's level of academic accomplishment
- 3) To organize and strengthen functions of the subject meeting and the Committee of Management and Evaluation of Academic Performance, in order to enhance objectivity, fairness, and reliability of evaluation and grading procedures
- 4) While improving process-oriented evaluation, performance evaluation is recommended to reflect at least 40% of semester-level grades. However, the performance evaluation shall be reflected in at least 20% of the semester's performance evaluation for subjects with 2 or less units, and the rate of reflection of the performance evaluation shall be determined autonomously for 12th graders, but 100% of the written evaluation is not possible.
- 5) To develop and apply diverse forms of evaluation, taking the purpose of absolute evaluation system into consideration
- 6) To guarantee the validity, fairness and transparency of evaluation
- 7) To apply grades based on both absolute evaluation and Stanine (Standard Nine) scale
- 8) To establish a proper school record system in accordance with the 2023 college admissions improvement plan

#### 3) Evaluation and Management of Academic Achievement

- a) Evaluation of academic achievement is done in two ways: written exam and performance assessment
- b) Ratio, standards, method, and timing of the performance test, and method of cut score calculation, are decided by each Subject Meeting and finalized by the principal after Academic Performance Committee's review.
- c) Written exam questions should be valid, trustworthy, objective. The 'two-dimensional purpose classification table (in NEIS)' should be compiled and used, and teachers should minimize the test result differences from class to class by collaboration in the process of question making.

#### Processing the Result of Tests

- 1) Grades for each subject should be finalized by the teacher in charge; he/she has to combine scores of written tests and performance tests, and calculate raw score, average score, standard deviation, ranking, class of rank (Stanine), and number of students, and should be managed by computing system.
- 2) Raw scores are rounded up to the first decimal place and recorded as whole numbers  $(4.1 \to 4).$
- 3) Grades for each subject are calculated according to the rankings of the student's sum score of regular tests and performance test.

- 4) Teachers are recommended to mark each question a different score in order not to cause a tie score among students.
- 5) Ranking is calculated after adding the regular test scores and performance test, and rounded off from the third decimal place to the second decimal place.



- · Minimum of 15 hours of sex education for each grade level every year (including 1 hour each, a total of 2 hours of sex trafficking, sexual violence prevention education)
- · 1 hour each, a total of 3 hours of sexual harassment, sex trafficking, sexual violence prevention education for faculty members
- The health office will serve as an outlet for sexual harassment complaints and assign one male and one female counselor to help deal with such issues

#### Prevention Program for Infectious Disease

- · Regular monitoring of infectious diseases
- · Devise and carry out a school-wide plan to prevent infectious diseases
- · Provide health information by handing out health leaflets and sending school newsletters






